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The gold standard for diagnosis of cirrhosis is a liver biopsy, through a percutaneous, transjugular, laparoscopic, or fine-needle approach. A biopsy is not necessary if the clinical, laboratory, and radiologic data suggests cirrhosis. Cirrhosis is the eighth leading cause of “years of lost life” in the United States and accounts for approximately 1% to 2% of all deaths in Europe.[Source 14)] Primary sclerosing cholangitis complications. Complications of primary sclerosing cholangitis may include: Liver disease and failure. Chronic inflammation of the bile ducts throughout your liver can lead to tissue scarring (cirrhosis), liver cell death and, eventually, loss of liver function. Primary biliary cholangitis (PBC), previously known as primary biliary cirrhosis, is an autoimmune disease of the liver.
